**Course: B 1501 New Testament Introduction I**

**Time:** Fall 2009, Thursday 6:15-7:55 PM

**Credit:** 2 credit hours

**Course Description and Objectives**

This course is a general introduction to New Testament (NT) literature, methods of interpretation, and various questions of critical study. It is designed to help students acquaint themselves with the history (especially the philosophical and religious contexts) of the Greco-Roman world and of Judaism contemporaneous with the beginnings of Christianity. New Testament Introduction 1 focuses on the life and teachings of Jesus as portrayed in the four canonical Gospels and the growth of the church in Acts. Students will also be introduced to some of the extra-canonical Gospels

The course has three specific objectives: to acquire (i) a knowledge of the contents and contexts of the Gospels and Acts; (ii) an ability to use the Gospels as historical sources for understanding early Christianity; and (iii) an understanding of the contemporary critical methods in NT scholarship that have been employed for evaluating and communicating the meaning of the Gospel texts.
