Post Modern Theology and the Church is a course designed to introduce and expose the student to post-modern currents in philosophy and theology, and their impact on the life of the church. The course will link three fields: the postmodern condition, theology, and ecclesiology. It will provide a foundational understanding of the post-modern condition, a critical evaluation of self appointed “post-modern” thinkers, and a platform for rethinking the avenues of ministry to and with the post-modern generation open to any serious Christian community.

Students will read, write short reports on readings, participate in class discussions, and write two term papers, all of which will constitute evaluation materials.
