I. Course Description

This is the second portion of an introductory course designed to acquaint the student with the traditional expression and content of Christian theology. The scriptures and classical references, along with historical and contemporary sources will be used to examine main points of Christian Theology. We will examine the nature of the Christian faith and the specific doctrines concerning Jesus Christ, the Holy Spirit, the Church, and the Doctrine of Last Things.

II. Course Aim and Objectives

The purpose of this course is to introduce the general study of Christian systematic theology in a way that is inspirational, spiritually formative, and meaningful in life and ministry. The goal is to help the student become a better minister and disciple of Christ.

By the end of this course, the student should be able to:

- 1. Read with comprehension primary theological writings
- 2. Participate intelligently in the discussions about Christian doctrine that have occupied theologians throughout the history of the church
- 3. Understand the basic theological words, concepts, issues, and traditions in Christianity
- 4. Identify major theologians and their most significant theological contributions
- 5. Form reasonable belief-positions in regard to these issues, and articulate how these may influence and shape his/her ministry in the local church
- 6. Think and talk about Christian theological beliefs in a clearer, more informed manner
- 7. Be able to apply theological beliefs and concepts to his/her personal walk with Christ
- 8. Engage in the study of and reflection on Christian theological beliefs and practices

9. Interpret the world, personal existence, and all things in relation to the truth of God revealed in Jesus Christ

III. Format and Procedures

This course is designed as an individual presentation and group discussion class. The instructor will be responsible for the presentations of pertinent material in each session and will facilitate class discussions. Students are expected to prepare for each session by completing all assigned readings and to participate actively in class discussions, and to constructively contribute to the group's knowledge and understanding. Each student will prepare (3) one-page papers and make an oral presentation of the paper to the class.

The instructor will use the textbook and the student presentations to contribute to the learning and reflection during class discussions. Additional handouts and material will be presented as time allows. Note-taking is highly recommended and encouraged.

IV. Course Requirements

Students are expected to:

1. Attend 15 class sessions, beginning August 29 and ending December 19, 2023.

No class sessions will be held on October 10 (Break) and November 21 (Thanksgiving).

Adjustments may be made in the schedule during the semester, depending on the personal schedules of the instructor and students.

If a class session must be cancelled, advance notice will be given in class, or by email, phone call, and/or text-message.

Please inform the instructor when you must miss a class session.

Seminary policy does not allow more than 20% of class sessions to be missed during the semester. In other words, a student who misses four or more class sessions will automatically receive a final grade of "F" for the course.

2. Read the textbook by Thomas Oden, sections "Book Two" chapters 1-14 (pp 213 – 498) and "Book Three, chapters 1-11 (pp 501 -839). Be prepared at each class session to comment and raise questions on the assigned textbook material, and complete the papers and the presentations as assigned.

V. Textbook:

Thomas C. Oden. <u>Classic Christianity, A systematic Theology</u>. HarperCollns (Harper One), New York. One Volume edition 1992. (Previously published as three volumes, 1987, 1989, 1992) Available from Christian Books for about \$31.

A copy of the <u>Baptist Faith and Message</u> comparing the 1925, 1963, and 2000 versions will be handed out at the beginning of the class. Portions from these will be discussed briefly as they relate to class topics. The Course schedule lists the sections that will be discussed, for example: "BFM 2. God the Son" refers to Section 2 about God the Son in the Baptist Faith and Message. The comparison chart is available at website: https://bfm.sbc.net/comparison-chart/

VI. Coursework:

1. Papers and Presentations: 60%

(3) One-page papers and presentations about classical Theologians, Church Conferences, or Topics. Each Paper/presentation is worth 20% of the final grade.

Topics for Papers/ Presentations:

First Paper: An Early Classical Theologian of your choosing (Before the Reformation)

Second Paper: An Ecumenical Conference or a Statement of Faith

Third Paper: A Modern Theologian (During the Reformation and up to today)

Each paper will contain a brief summary emphasizing the following:

Describe the important facts and issues.

Describe what was important about this person or meeting.

Explain how the results apply to us today.

Along with the papers, on the same day that they are due, a 3-5 minute presentation will be made during class to briefly cover the important aspects of the topic or theologian examined. Copies of each paper will be handed out to the other students for their reference during the next class session. (Note: The instructor will hand out a list of suggested theologians and church conferences from which to choose)

Note: Leland follows the traditional academic writing standards of Times New Roman, 12 font, with 1 inch margins. See pages 6-10 in Leland's <u>Student Handbook</u> for general resources. Students may find a copy of this document on Leland's website.

2. Four Quizzes. 20% (Each worth 5%)

Quizzes will Cover topics and theological terms from the textbook and class discussions. Quizzes will each have 5 or more questions requiring short answers of about 1-5 sentences.

3. Participation and Discussion: 20%

4. Extra Credit: (5%)

Complete an additional One-Page Paper and make a presentation about a theological topic, a church conference or statement of faith, or a theologian of his/her choice.

Note: Extra credit will be due on or before December 5.
